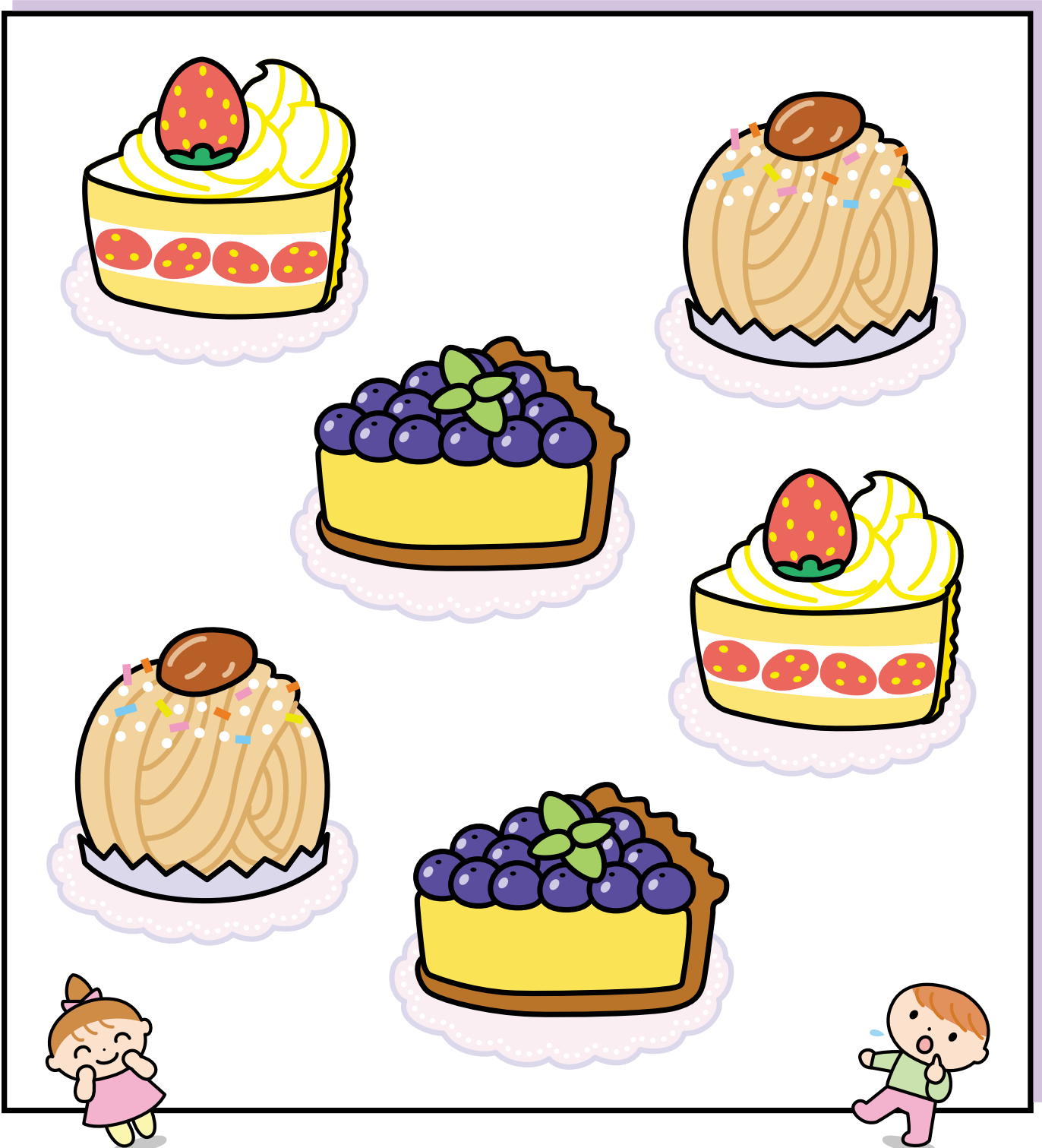


Let's Find the Matching Cakes

To Parents: This activity focuses on your child's observational skills. Ask your child to point to the cakes that are the same, and then draw a line between each of the three pairs.





Draw a line to connect each cake with its match.

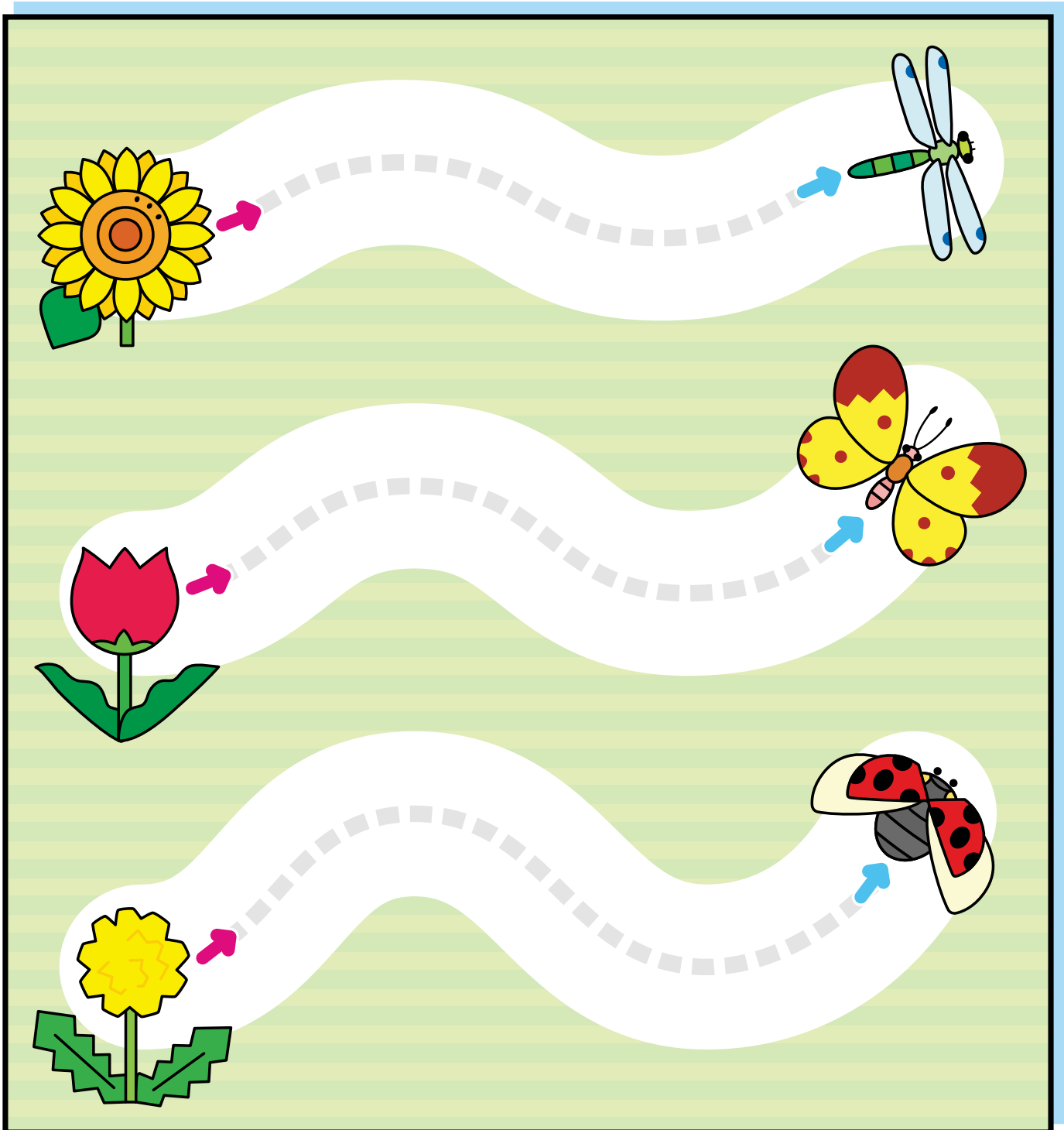


Let's Draw Curved Lines

To Parents: This activity is designed to teach how to draw curved lines for handwriting practice. Have your child follow each gray dotted line with his or her finger and then with a crayon.





Show how the insects fly away from the flowers. Follow the lines from  to . Then, trace the lines with a crayon.

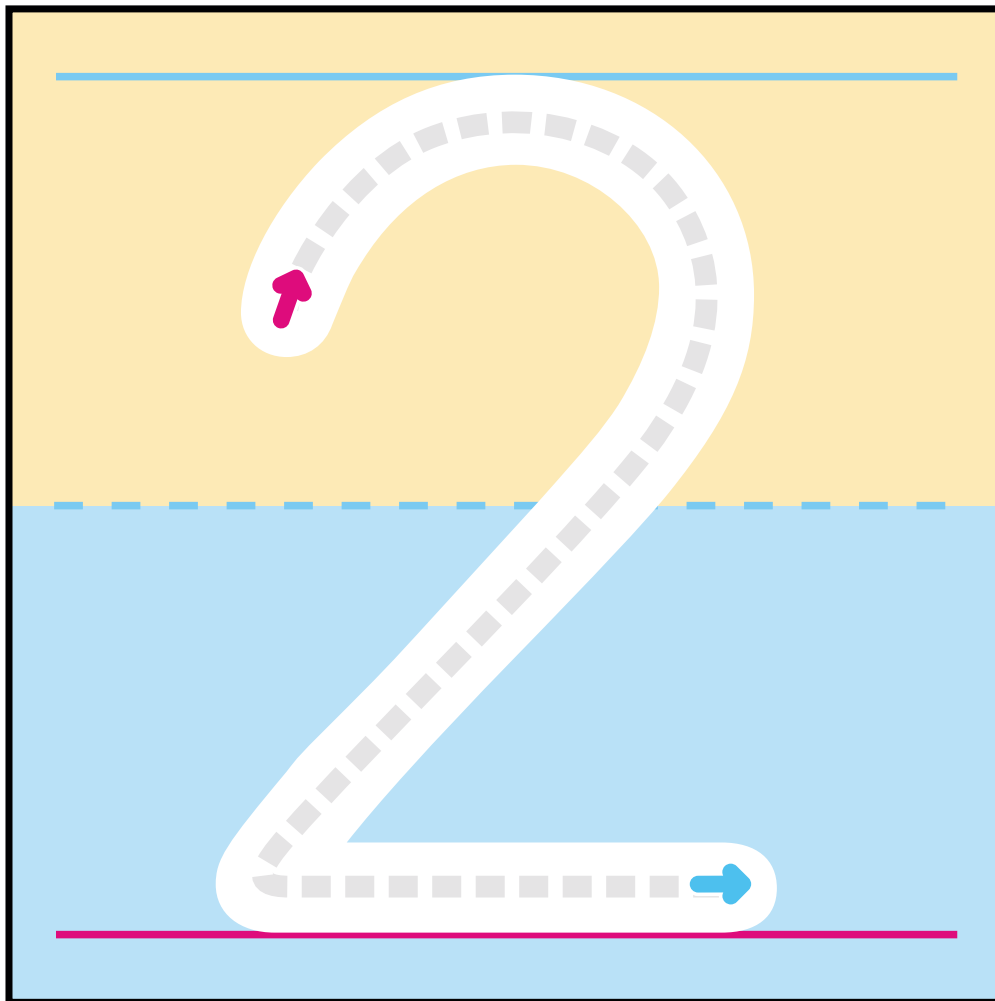
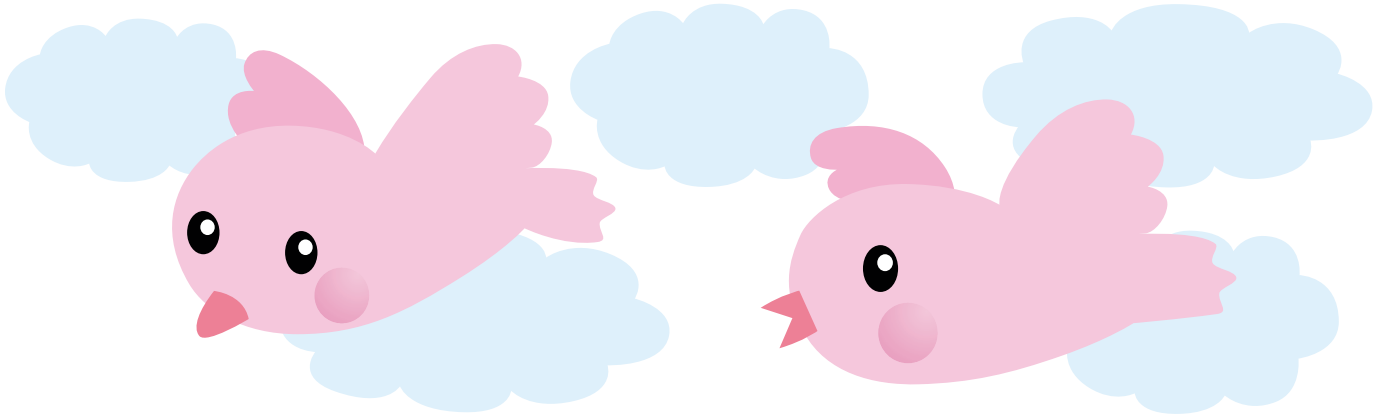


Let's Trace the Number

To Parents: This activity ties the idea of quantity (two) to the symbol that represents that quantity (2) and helps foster proper handwriting. You may have your child trace the gray dotted line with a crayon if she or he is able.




How many birds are there? Say the number out loud.
Then, trace the line from  to  with your finger.



Let's Put Fish in the Bowl

To Parents: This activity helps develop fine motor skills while focusing on size relationships. Your child must determine which fish to place on which yellow square, based on its size.



Put the fish in the fishbowl. Glue each of the three fish to the matching .



Parents: Cut out the fish for your child.
