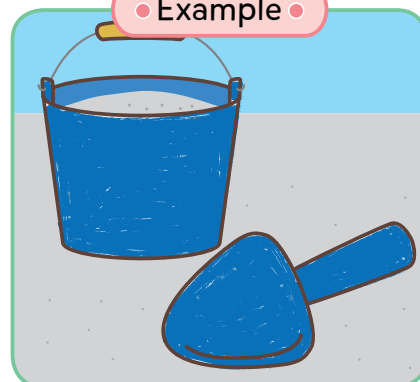


# Let's Color the Pail and the Shovel

Color the pail and shovel blue.

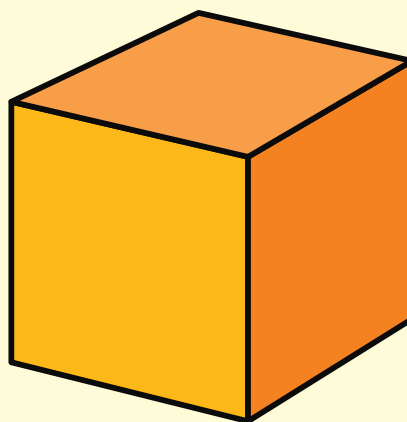
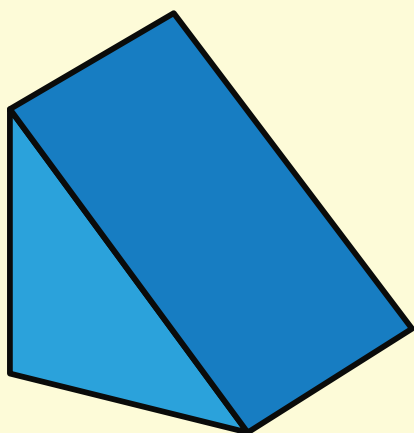
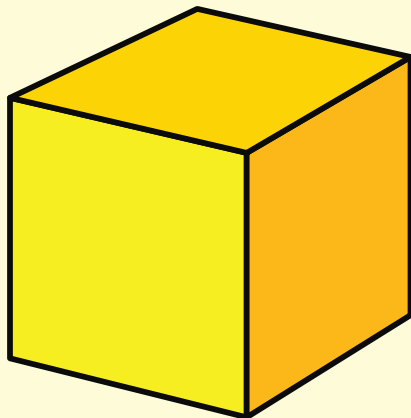
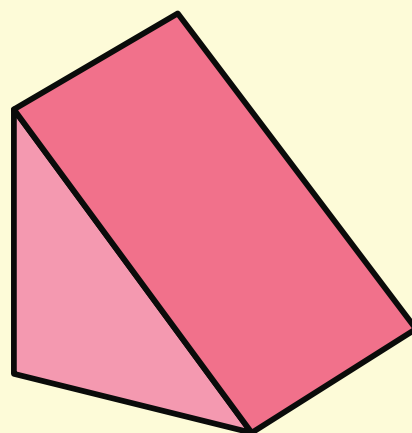
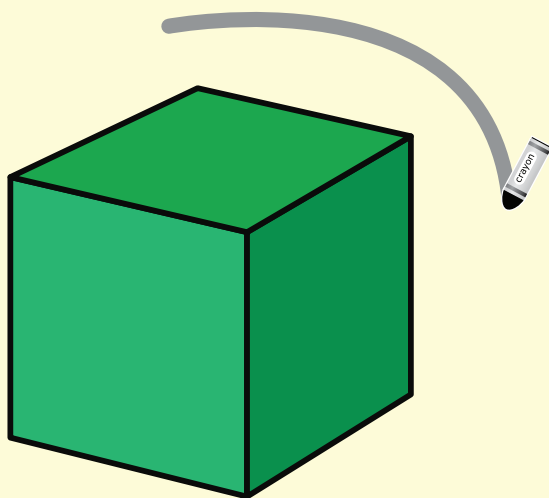


## Let's Find the Squares

**To Parents:** In this activity, your child will practice recognizing different shapes. When he or she is done circling the square blocks, extend the activity. Ask, "Which shape is blue?" and "Which shape is orange?"

## Let's Trace the Shapes

**To Parents:** Here, your child will trace the triangle and rectangle that make up the house. Not only will this activity increase your child's understanding of shapes, but it will also help build writing skills.

## Let's Draw with Triangles

**To Parents:** First, have your child trace the gray outlines of the triangles. Encourage her or him to stop at each corner before changing directions. Then, your child can decorate the butterfly and fish. Make sure your child knows that her or his drawing does not need to match the example exactly.
